

# Anticipating Sunday...

# The Hope of New Life

Hope overcomes despair for God's people: this is the message of the readings for today. The hope of new life is evident in the story of "dry bones" from Ezekiel. The children of Israel declare their hope is lost. The prophet's experience in the valley of dry bones inspires him to preach renewed hope to the people. Psalm 130 sings of hope in God and God's word. The work of God's Spirit gives hope of new life in Paul's letter to the church at Rome. The Gospel of John tells the hope-filled story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead. The gospel gives us encouraging words to sustain us through the approaching despair of Christ's passion and brings us to the fulfillment of hope on Easter. Martha's wistful words to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here. . . . But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him" (John 11:21-22), reflect the hope of God's people in the face of despair, even in the face of death.

Each text encourages hearers to hope in God and God's word. How do Christians experience unfulfilled hope? This is the challenge for those who interpret today's texts for hearers. Israel's woes are not at an end; other psalms tell of struggle and pain; the Christbelievers at Rome are persecuted; Jesus who raises Lazarus from the dead soon dies. And yet hope is fulfilled as Paul proclaims "all Israel will be saved" (Rom. 11:26). Psalm 46 sings of God's presence in time of trouble. A preview of the hope of the resurrection will sustain believers in these final days of Lent (John 20:17). The Christian's confidence in the resurrection of the dead epitomizes their hope in Christ.

# Sunday, March 26, 2023 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Lent

In Sunday's gospel Jesus reveals his power over death by raising Lazarus from the dead. The prophet Ezekiel prophesies God breathing new life into dry bones. To those in exile or living in the shadows of death, these stories proclaim God's promise of resurrection. In baptism we die with Christ that we might also be raised with him to new life. At the Easter Vigil we will welcome the newly baptized as we remember God's unfailing promise in our baptism.

### The Readings in the Bible

First Reading: Ezekiel 37:1-14

Ezekiel's vision of the valley of dry bones is a promise that Israel as a nation, though dead in exile, will live again in their land through God's life-giving spirit. Three times Israel is assured that through this vision they will know that "I am the LORD."

<sup>1</sup>The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. <sup>2</sup>He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. <sup>3</sup>He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." <sup>4</sup>Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. <sup>5</sup>Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. <sup>6</sup>I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD."

<sup>7</sup>So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. <sup>8</sup>I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. <sup>9</sup>Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to

the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." <sup>10</sup>I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

<sup>11</sup>Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' <sup>12</sup>Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. <sup>13</sup>And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. <sup>14</sup>I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act, says the Lord."

Psalm: Psalm 130

I wait for you, O LORD; in your word is my hope. (Ps. 130:5)

<sup>1</sup>Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD;

<sup>2</sup>O LORD, hear my voice!

Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplication.

<sup>3</sup>If you were to keep watch over sins,

O LORD, who could stand?

<sup>4</sup>Yet with you is forgiveness,

in order that you may be feared.

<sup>5</sup>I wait for you, O LORD; my soul waits; in your word is my hope.

<sup>6</sup>My soul waits for the Lord more than those who keep watch for the morning, more than those who keep watch for the morning.

<sup>7</sup>O Israel, wait for the LORD, for with the LORD there is steadfast love; with the LORD there is plenteous redemption.

<sup>8</sup>For the LORD shall redeem Israel from all their sins.

Second Reading: Romans 8:6-11

For Paul, Christian spirituality entails living in the reality of the Holy Spirit. The driving force behind our actions and values is not our sinful desire for self-satisfaction but the very Spirit by which God raised Jesus from the dead and will also raise us from the dead.

<sup>6</sup>To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. <sup>7</sup>For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, <sup>8</sup>and those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

<sup>9</sup>But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. <sup>10</sup>But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. <sup>11</sup>If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

#### **Gospel: John 11:1-45**

Jesus is moved to sorrow when his friend Lazarus falls ill and dies. Then, in a dramatic scene, he calls his friend out of the tomb and restores him to life.

<sup>1</sup>Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. <sup>2</sup>Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. <sup>3</sup>So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." <sup>4</sup>But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." <sup>5</sup>Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, <sup>6</sup>after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was.

<sup>7</sup>Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." <sup>8</sup>The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" <sup>9</sup>Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. <sup>10</sup>But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them." <sup>11</sup>After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him." <sup>12</sup>The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." <sup>13</sup>Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. <sup>14</sup>Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. <sup>15</sup>For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." <sup>16</sup>Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

<sup>17</sup>When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. <sup>18</sup>Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, <sup>19</sup>and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. <sup>20</sup>When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. <sup>21</sup>Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. <sup>22</sup>But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." <sup>23</sup>Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." <sup>24</sup>Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." <sup>25</sup>Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, <sup>26</sup>and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" <sup>27</sup>She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

<sup>28</sup>When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." <sup>29</sup>And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. <sup>30</sup>Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. <sup>31</sup>The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb

to weep there. <sup>32</sup>When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." <sup>33</sup>When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. <sup>34</sup>He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." <sup>35</sup>Jesus began to weep. <sup>36</sup>So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" <sup>37</sup>But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

<sup>38</sup>Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. <sup>39</sup>Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him,



"Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." <sup>40</sup>Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" <sup>41</sup>So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. <sup>42</sup>I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." <sup>43</sup>When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" <sup>44</sup>The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to

them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

<sup>45</sup>Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.

#### About the Readings in the Bible...

The Bible readings this coming Sunday are for everyone who feels half dead, for everyone who sees death everywhere, as well as for everyone who is afraid to even think about death. Come to worship, to receive the breath of the Spirit, to hear the voice of Christ, to be fed at the table, and to celebrate the life God gives.

#### **Ezekiel 37:1-14**

Ezekiel was a sixth-century prophet living in Babylon during the exile. His prophecies, part of the Priestly tradition that is found throughout the Old Testament, proclaim that despite the destruction of Jerusalem and its temple in 587, God will eventually restore Israel to even greater glory. Perhaps the most beloved passage of the book is this vision in chapter 37 of a restored Israel, returned from Babylon to their own land. Christians have seen also in Ezekiel's vision a picture of the resurrection of the dead at the end of time. Both now and at the end we

rise up in response to the word of the Lord. Through the power of the Spirit's breath, baptism begins our new life, a life that will never end.

#### **Psalm 130**

After encountering the vision of the valley of the dry bones, we sing the penitential Psalm 130. We are the dry bones, waiting for the Lord. We trust that, although we have sinned, God will forgive. Through the words of this psalm, we articulate the deep meaning of Lent.

#### Romans 8:6-11

In the center of his letter to the church in Rome, Paul concluded his discussion of law and gospel by contrasting life in the flesh with life in the Spirit. For those in Christ, sin is already dead; the Spirit gives life. For Paul, the term "flesh" referred to the body as it is misused and controlled by the power of sin and the term "Spirit" to the power of the risen Christ in the individual and community. Paul uses the language of death and life to describe the radical nature of the effect of the indwelling of Christ's Spirit. We are now dead to sin, and the new life of Christ is already experienced here and how.

#### John 11:1-45

In this last of the seven signs in the gospel of John that demonstrate Jesus' divinity, Jesus first explained the sign and then performed it. As expected in John's gospel, the sign functions as a metaphor for the identity of Jesus. What happens to Lazarus is resuscitation, not the resurrection: Christ is the resurrection, and his power gives life to this world. In John's narrative, it is the raising of Lazarus that incited the authorities to seek Jesus' execution. The church has seen in this last great Johannine sign a picture of baptism: we too were dead, but the word of Christ has called us from death and restored us to life in the Spirit. Thus Lent is our annual emerging from the grave, our helping to unbind one another for vibrant life together.

## Images in the Readings

Many medieval churches housed burials and contain even glass-cased skeletons, but most contemporary churches avoid picturing those bones that are left after the flesh has rotted away. Our culture avoids dealing directly and honestly with death: many people are even replacing the verb "died" with the term "passed," as if with everyone going off to heaven, there really is no death. In contrast, this Sunday presents us with the images of the **grave**, the **stink** of bodily decomposition, and the pile of **bones**. Furthermore, Paul's use of the term "**flesh**" as a metaphor for the misused human life intensifies this Sunday's honesty about human mortality. These texts represent the Bible's stark attention to the reality of death, both the "death" that is sin and the finality of death when our bodies die. When we fully acknowledge the natural fact of death, we are ready to praise God's life as gift.

# Mary and Martha

Both women have the same grief. Both women believe Jesus has the power. And both women say the same thing: "If you had been here, my brother would not have died" (John 11:21, 32). Mary and Martha have often been pitted against each other—the be-er vs. the do-er. Mary and Martha are like most siblings: opposites in many ways and alike in others. Our families of origin shape who we are. But we are also part of God's family, where Jesus shows up and all who believe receive new life.

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# Sad Anniversaries

Throughout the US, Black women have been standing up and reminding people to say the names of Black people who have been killed for living their lives. This year is the eleventh anniversary of Trayvon Martin's murder, the sixty-eighth anniversary of Emmett Till's murder, and the third anniversary of George Floyd's murder along with anniversaries of countless other Black, Indigenous, and people of color in the United States. Hearing the words of Ezekiel today we might imagine those dry bones around us of people who have been killed for the color of their skin, the language they speak, or the presentation of their gender. Black women who remind us to say their names keep those bones alive in our world rather than letting them fade into history. Until the day God brings forth all bones from the grave into the New Jerusalem, we must find ourselves speaking for those bones and the lives they once carried.

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# **A NEW CREATION**

In the words of the baptismal liturgy, "By water and the word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to new life in Jesus Christ." Our creeds affirm not some immortality of the soul, but rather "the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting," "the life of the world to come." Christians trust that God enlivens not only this natural existence, but also a life other than and beyond this world, a new creation after this entire created universe has come to its end. Our life in Christ begins at baptism and extends, by the mystery of God, beyond time and space.

#### Connections with Creation

Where do you feel the pain of Earth and its creatures or hear the groaning of God's creation? When we weep for Earth—when we feel outrage for dying coral, burning forests, and rising seas, and for all who suffer because of ecological devastation—God grieves with us. The fact that Jesus wept suggests that the first step in birthing new life comes when we step *toward* the pain, not away, and when we do so in the presence of God. God, who shares our suffering, knows that new life begins when we honor our pain for the world and move beyond the numbness and denial that pretend everything is fine. In vulnerability Jesus opens to a power greater than himself and raises Lazarus from the dead. Even as you grieve for the planet, Jesus summoning you out of the tomb and into the struggle to protect life.

The items required to make to make **ONE Personal Care Kit,** include:

- ONE light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- TWO or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping
- ONE adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging\*
- ONE sturdy comb, remove packaging
- ONE metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging
   \* Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope, no plastic bags or wrap

#### SOME IMPORTANT GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER

- Be sure to shop for light- or medium-weight towels, which are easier for Kit recipients to hand wash and air dry, take up less storage space and are considerably less expensive than the fluffier towels we may prefer to use.
- Bath towels vary in size. The 52" X 27" size listed in the guidelines is the maximum size. 20" x 40" is a good guideline for a minimum size.
- Please give new items only.
- Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages or your group's name.
- Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.
- Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed.
- All items should be new and in good condition.
- Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.



We've all received funding appeals that go something like this: "Your gift will be matched dollar for dollar." How would you like to not just double your donation to end world hunger, but increase it TEN-FOLD? And not by giving money, but by writing a brief letter to your Congressman or Senator?

It's not as fantastical as it may seem. All across America, thousands of churches and other groups donate millions of pounds of food to the hungry every year. As magnificent as these efforts are, did you know that Federal funding on food programs is TEN TIMES the amount of donated food? Through the Farm Bill, up for reauthorization this year, Congress spends billions on SNAP (CalFresh), WIC (supplementary food for Women, Infants and Children), Food for Peace overseas, and dozens of other nutrition programs. Personal letters to Congress are a proven way to influence Federal policy.

Every year Bread for the World, a Christian citizen's organization affiliated with the ELCA, organizes an Offering of Letters on hunger, focusing attention on bipartisan legislation. THIS YEAR'S OFFERING OF LETTERS AT UNITED IN GRACE IS SUNDAY, APRIL 23 AFTER WORSHIP.

Bread for the World has a strong track record over almost 50 years, advocating for hungry people. Just in the last two years it helped reduce child poverty in the U.S. by 45 percent through the Child Tax Credit, and arranged to feed millions of women and children worldwide through the bipartisan Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act. United in Grace already helps people in need. When we're in our building we fill up barrels of food. People volunteer at the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano Counties. 


# WEDNESDAY BOOK GROUPS

## What we're reading: CONVICTIONS: HOW I LEARNED WHAT MATTERS MOST



Marcus J. Borg contends that Christians in America are at their best when they focus on hope and transformation. Each chapter of this book embodies a distinct conviction. Borg writes provocatively and compellingly on the beliefs that can deeply ground us. Examples include: "God is real and a mystery; salvation is more about this life than an afterlife; the Bible can be true without being literally true; Jesus's death on the cross matters—but not because he paid for our sins; God is passionate about justice and the poor; and to love God is to love like God."

Borg calls all Christians to reject divisiveness and exclusivity and create communities that celebrate joy, possibility and

renewal. He reflects on what matters most, bringing to earth the kingdom of God which Jesus talked about and transforming our relationships with one another.


